Lesson or Unit Plan for Adventures of Huckleberry Finn

Subject:	Suggested Time Frame:

Objective(s): Students will read and analyze Mark Twain's "Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" to gain an understanding of life during the mid-1800s and the themes that were important to Twain when he wrote the book towards the end of the 19th century.

Topics

Assessments: Weekly multiple choice (MC) questions based on reading and 2 Open-Ended Response (OERs) questions per week.

Subject Area Integration: History, American Literature, Writing

Background Information Required for Lesson: A background on Samuel Clemens (Mark Twain) and the storyline of <u>The Adventures of Tom Sawyer</u>.

Materials: Book - any format will work, but should not be abridged

Technology: Access to the internet, computer or laptop is preferrable but anywhere the student can type responses to essay questions.

Related Twain Quotes/Passages: NA

Lesson Sequence:

Week 1: Assignment will be introduced to the students; they will have a few days to learn or review information on Mark Twain (https://marktwainhouse.org/about/mark-twain/) and Tom Sawyer. By the end of the week the students should have read the Intro through chapter 7, completed the MC for content review and 2 essay questions using complete sentences.

Week 1: MC Questions (There are two questions per chapter provided. All questions could be used, but I would suggest a random selection of 5 questions.)

**Here is an example of a set of questions for the first week, just basic knowledge questions.

- 1. In what book do readers first meet Huckleberry Finn?

OERs (Essay Questions)

- 1. Huckleberry believes in many superstitions. Do you think luck plays a part in your life? Do you believe in any superstitions, such as lucky numbers or a particular animal or insect bringing good or bad luck? Explain your responses fully.
- 2. Huck decides to escape his father by faking his own death. Do you think this was the right thing to do or do you think there might have been a better solution? If something like this (Pap's treatment of Huck) was going on in today's world, what do you think the kid in the situation should do? Explain your responses fully.

Week 2: Students will read chapter 8-12, complete MC questions and the following 2 OERs

OERs (Essay Questions)

- 1. In chapter 8, Huck finds Jim on the island. Jim has run away because he overheard Miss Watson discussing selling him for \$800 to a slave trader who would take him to New Orleans, separating him from his family. Keep in mind the fact that Jim did not wait to hear if Miss Watson would indeed sell him and by running away, he is leaving his family. Do you think Jim was justified in his actions? Explain your answer and tell me what you think you would have done if you were in the same situation.
- 2. In chapter 12, Huck and Jim discuss the morality of stealing. Review their conversations and then explain your thoughts on what they say and do. Do you agree or disagree with them? If you were in a similar situation, what do you think you would do. Explain.

Week 3: Students will read chapter 13-16, complete MC questions and the following 2 OERs

OERs (Essay Questions)

- 1. Think about the relationship that Huck and Jim are developing. There are times they appear to be equals and times when they don't. What are your thoughts on their relationship and do you think one or the other should be leading this "adventure". Explain.
- 2. There are two times so far that Huck has had to decide whether he should help Jim escape or allow those who are looking for him to find him. This happens once on the island and again when slave hunters want to search Huck's raft. Both times Huck makes the decision to protect Jim, even though he is not sure it is the right decision. Why does he end up making this decision? How do these decisions affect Huck as a character? Explain.

Week 4: Students will read chapter 17-20, complete MC questions and the following 2 OERs

OERs (Essay Questions)

- 1. In chapters 17 and 18 Huck meets the Grangerfords and the family they have a feud with, the Shepherdsons. Give a brief accounting of what happened with the two families during the two chapters and then explain your thoughts on why the author would include these characters and their feud into this novel.
- 2. In chapter 19, Huck, Jim and the reader meet the Duke and the Dauphin/King. Are these men dangerous to Huck and Jim? Explain your response. You may want to discuss some of their actions to support your thoughts.

Week 5: Students will read chapter 21-25, complete MC questions and the following 2 $\ensuremath{\mathrm{OERs}}$

OERs (Essay Questions)

1. Considering the decisions Huck has made during his journey with Jim, why do you think he continued to allow the Duke and the King to take advantage of people to the point of helping them to escape? Do you

- think it is the norm for his character or does it go against the characterization of Huck up until this point in the novel? Explain.
- 2. Chapter 24 ends with Huck stating, "It was enough to make a body ashamed of the human race." What is his statement referring to? Do you agree with him? Explain and discuss what you may or may not do if a similar situation were to happen in your life.

Week 6: Students will read chapter 26-30, complete MC questions and the following 2 OERs

OERs (Essay Questions)

- 1. Why do you think Huck breaks down and tells Mary Jane what is going on and where the money is? Does this fit with what you know of Huck so far? Explain.
- 2. Do you think the Duke and the King are capable con men? Do you think hanging out with Huck and Jim and traveling with them on their raft was a help or a hindrance? Explain your answers.

Week 7: Students will read chapter 31-36, complete MC questions and the following 2 OERs

OERs (Essay Questions)

- 1. In chapter 31, Jim is returned to slavery. How does Huck react to this and what is his final decision about Jim and slavery overall? If a similar situation happened to you in today's world, for instance a friend of yours was being abused or not safe in their home environment, and they were forced to return to it...what do you think would be the right thing for you to do, if anything, and what do you think you would be capable of doing? Explain.
- 2. When Tom Sawyer appears in the novel, he brings back the fun and adventure that Huck enjoys. Do you think Tom's appearance was necessary? Do you believe it falls in line with what was going on in the rest of the book? Explain your answer.

Week 8: Students will read chapter 37 through the end, complete MC questions and the following $2 \ \mathrm{OERs}$

OERs (Essay Questions)

- 1. At the end of the book both Huck and the reader learn about the death of Pap and that Jim knew the whole time. What do you think of his decision to keep this information from Huck? Who was Jim thinking of when he made the decision? Explain your thoughts.
- 2. Now that you have completed the novel, "Adventures of Huckleberry Finn", what are your overall thoughts? Do you feel that this book is an important novel in American history? Please explain thoroughly with at least 5-7 sentences.

Strategies for Exceptional Students: Entire assignment will be open and students will be able to work at their own pace, all students will be required to meet the deadlines, but they can complete their work earlier than the due date.

Suggested Follow-Up Activities: Have a wrap up in person meeting to gain overall impressions and wrap up the assignment.
